

Eric Metaxas is a #1 *New York Times* bestselling author, radio host, and commentator who speaks to tens of thousands around the U.S. and internationally each year. Dick Cavett has credited Eric with having “the ability to deal with serious matters in a way that manages to be at once profound and thoroughly entertaining,” and ABC News has called him a “photogenic, witty ambassador for faith in public life.”

Eric’s books include the *New York Times* bestsellers *Bonhoeffer*, *If You Can Keep It*, *Miracles*, *Amazing Grace*, *Seven Men*, and *Seven Women*. Additionally he was a writer for *VeggieTales* and has written more than thirty children’s books, including the best-sellers *Squanto* and the *Miracle of Thanksgiving* and *It’s Time to Sleep, My Love*, illustrated by Nancy Tillman.

He is the host of *The Eric Metaxas Show*, a nationally syndicated radio program heard in more than 120 cities around the U.S. and featuring in-depth interviews with a wide variety of guests such as David Brooks, Joseph Fiennes, Jason Gay, Tony Hale, Mary Karr, LeCrae, Adam McKay, and Peggy Noonan.

Metaxas was the keynote speaker at the 2012 National Prayer Breakfast in Washington DC, an event attended by the President and First Lady, the Vice President, members of Congress, and other U.S. and world leaders.

Eric’s commentaries, humor writing, book and movie reviews, and poetry have appeared in *The New Yorker*, *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, and *National Review*. His *Wall Street Journal* op-ed, “Science Increasingly Makes the Case for God” is the most popular and shared piece in the history of the Journal.

Metaxas is the founder and host of *Socrates in the City: Conversations on the Examined Life*, an interview series of “entertaining and thought-provoking discussions on ‘life, God, and other small topics’” featuring Malcolm Gladwell, Dr. Francis Collins, and N. T. Wright, among many others. Metaxas has been featured as a cultural commentator on CNN, MSNBC, and Fox News programs, and he has been interviewed about his work on the *Today Show*, *Fox and Friends*, The History Channel, and C-SPAN’s *Q&A with Brian Lamb*.
